Back To School! Cherry Creek School District

Phase-In Start

Many students experienced trauma during the past year due to the isolation and stress of the pandemic. The goal for next year is to ensure all students have the social-emotional and mental health support they need to transition out of the pandemic and into a successful school year.

To aid in that goal, Cherry Creek will have a Phase-In start to the school year during the first three days of school in August. That means some grades will come to school on Monday, August 16, and some grades will come on Tuesday, August 17. All grade levels will be back in the classroom starting Wednesday, August 18. Please see the following table for details about elementary and middle school dates. All kindergarten students will receive specific information from their schools. High school students will hear directly from their school about the Phase-In schedule.

After 32 Years Of Dedication Teaching Students, Mrs. Janet Ragnow Is Retiring

"How little did I know what a big part Walnut Hills Community Elementary School would play in my life" says Jan.

After moving from Boulder, CO, to the Walnut Hills subdivision in 1971, Jan Leikam attended Walnut Hills Elementary from 4th to 6th grade. Back then there were pods, which were open classrooms, mixed grade levels, and a library directly in the middle of the school. Arapahoe Road was just a two-laned street, and open fields abound. "I loved every minute! I learned so much when I was a student there. It is where I developed my love of music", comments Jan about the flute and singing.

Jan continued in the Cherry Creek school system and, in 8th grade at West Junior High, she realized she wanted to be a teacher. "I loved babysitting, taking the neighborhood kids on nature walks, and I was an avid reader always having my nose in a book." At Cherry Creek High School, Jan was selected to participate in an independent study program. She jumped at the opportunity and returned to Walnut Hills Elementary to work in the classroom for a semester. She was hooked! "I knew this is what I was called to do, teach."

In 1986, Jan graduated from the University of Northern Colorado with a Bachelors in Education and began substitute teaching. She had the strongest of desires to teach in the Cherry Creek School District. Through perseverance, Jan was hired at Polton Elementary School. No one would have ever predicted that she would be working with Kerry Tripp for the next 8 years. Ms. Tripp, a former teacher at Walnut Hills Elementary, actually taught Jan when Jan was in 5th and 6th grades. While at Polton, Jan married the love of her life, Bob Ragnow and became Jan Ragnow. A year later, they returned to Walnut Hills purchasing a home near the school. "I had always loved this community and coming back to the place where I fell in love with education was fate", says Jan smiling. Also, "my parents still lived in the neighborhood and so did one of my brothers. My other brother settled just across Dry Creek Rd in Willow Creek. I think that speaks volumes about Walnut Hills neighborhood and surrounding area. I know we aren't the only kids who have come home to Walnut Hills over the years."

In 1997, Jan continued her career in teaching at Summit Elementary. There she worked with outstanding colleagues and grew as a professional gaining experience in the use of technology. During her 6 years at Summit, Jan and Bob were blessed with two children, Samantha and Michael. While Summit was an excellent school, Jan's desire was to teach at, and have her children attend, Walnut Hills Elementary. "It felt like destiny that our children would go to the same elementary school and graduate from the same high school as I did", says Jan.

Jan began work at Walnut Hills in 2005 and continued for the next 16 years teaching 5th

grade. She credits her longevity to the school's dedication on innovation, focus on the arts, technology, problem solving, and invention. "What a great place to be a child, and a teacher" comments Jan about her experiences at Walnut Hills. "My education came full circle from the first day I stepped into Walnut Hills as a student, to the day I stepped out after a 32-year teaching career. I have loved every minute, each challenge, every spark in a child's eye when they understood a new concept or solved a problem" says Jan proudly. Proud she should be.

Change may be difficult for some, but Jan looks to the future with great anticipation. Her love of continued learning is the drive for her next accomplishments. As for teaching "You learn a lot in 3 decades". "One thing I know for sure is I'll be back at Walnut Hills, volunteering this time."

Further, Jan is currently authoring her first book based on her experiences related to her 50-day hospital battle following contracting the COVID-19 virus. Jan also foresees writing a book

Orange Suns and Gold Finches

Ironically, the wet spring this year brought us out of what seems a perpetual drought just as the rest of the western US was set aflame. Now in mid-July with the heat and the smoke haze lingering it is hard to find a blue sky. Seems like every morning a bright orange sun comes up over the horizon and quite often there are no mountains to be seen at all.

I've been following the Colorado Photography threads on Facebook recently. If you want to know why we live here just take a peek at the moose in the lakes and the bobcats tending their young, or the night scenes of the milky way over the mountain peaks, or the birds in the Pawnee Grasslands, or the goldfinches feeding on the thistle, and you will remember.




Scholarship Fund Needs Your Ongoing Support

We encourage all Walnut Hills neighbors, including businesses, to contribute to this worthwhile program. The Fund needs your support in order to continue awarding \$2,500 college scholarships to Walnut Hills graduating seniors each year, as well as awarding the new Innovation Grant for students continuing their education at a trade school or two-year program. Donating to the fund is a unique way to support our neighborhood and build community. Also, if you work for a business that is looking to make a charitable donation, consider suggesting this one!

To clear up some confusion expressed by neighbors, the Scholarship Fund is a separate entity from the Civic Association. The IRS has confirmed that the Walnut Hills Scholarship Fund holds 501(c)(3) nonprofit status. Only contributions made payable to the Walnut Hills Scholarship Fund are tax-deductible and are for the sole purpose of providing college scholarships to Walnut Hills graduating seniors. Currently, about 10% of Walnut Hills households contribute to the Scholarship Fund. Won't you help increase this number? This is a 50-year tradition of Walnut Hills and really sets us apart from surrounding neighborhoods.




