Walnut Hills Qualifies For Traffic Management

E. Costilla Blvd Traffic Calming Project Underway

What is the background on this project? In March of 2019, the WHCA applied to the Neighborhood Traffic Management Program (NTMP) for East Costilla Blvd between East Costilla Ave and S. Unita Street. We had heard a concern from a neighbor that the traffic volume and speeds in this area were a problem. The City conducted traffic counts and monitored speeds for 48 hours along this stretch of road and found that there were 777 cars in a 24 hour period with an average speed of 30 mph. This section of road has a posted speed limit of 25 mph. Because of these factors, in addition to the street being next to a school, the project became eligible for NTMP. In late 2019, the WHCA was notified that the project had been accepted into the program and was one of four projects to be selected. Total, the project received \$37,500 in funding.

What are the next steps? The next step in this exciting process is to gather neighborhood input. All of the Walnut Hills neighbors are important and have a voice, but because of the way the program is set up, the adjacent neighbors are ESPECIALLY important moving forward! The City of Centennial will be setting up the 1st Public Meeting the week of February 17, 2020. This meeting will introduce the NTMP program and is a listening session for the neighbors to decide what kind of traffic calming will be appropriate, what uses are occurring in the area, what concerns there are, etc. The City will use this information to develop a recommendation to present to the neighbors at the second Public Meeting most likely to be held in April. Notifications will be sent to the effected neighbors and the WHCA. Meeting location is yet to be determined, but the information will be distributed as soon as possible. Please be on the lookout for information regarding this program on the WHCA website at www.walnuthillscolorado.org.

Why are the effected/adjacent neighbors so important? Because these residents are anticipated to have to utilize/cross whatever traffic calming device is selected each time they leave their homes. While other neighbors will no doubt utilize/cross it, they will have alternate routes that would allow them to bypass the traffic calming devise. Please see the DRAFT of the Area of Effected Neighbors Map. If your home is shown as an effected neighbor, please participate in the development of this program! Ultimately, the developed traffic calming devise shown at Public Meeting \$2\$ with be voted on by ONLY the effected neighbors. Ballots will be sent to the homeowners via mail. A minimum of 50% of the ballots must be returned to the City and of those 2/3 must be a yes vote for the project to move forward. Please note, not returning a ballot counts as a 'no' vote! If the ballot count and vote count is not received the project stops and Walnut Hills will not be able to apply for this section of road again for 3 years.



March 3, 2020 - Presidential Primary

On March 3, 2020, Arapahoe County will hold a Presidential Primary election, which will determine the presidential nominees for each political party. All active voters will receive a ballot the week of Feb. 10, 2020. There are recent changes to Colorado's presidential primary process, so read on to make sure you're ready for the election on March 3.

The most comprehensive voter information for Arapahoe County can be found at arapahoevotes.com.

Update your voter registration

Make sure your voter registration is active and your mailing address is current by visiting www.govotecolorado.gov. The County uses this information to mail your ballot to you. Please note that ballots are not forwarded even if you have submitted a Change of Address form to the U.S. Postal Service.

Watch your mailbox

Ballots will be mailed to active registered voters the week of Feb. 10, 2020. Please allow one full week for your ballot to arrive.

If you do not receive your mail ballot, please visit www.govotecolorado.gov and verify your voter registration address is correct. Update your address, if necessary, and a replacement ballot will be mailed to your new address. Ballots cannot be forwarded by the U.S. Postal Service. If you have any other issues, please contact our office at 303-795-4511.

After Feb. 24, we can no longer send ballots by mail. Instead, you must go to a Voter Service and Polling Center to update your registration and request a ballot.

Who is on the ballot?

The Colorado Secretary of State maintains candidate information. Please visit the Secretary of State website for a list of candidates who have been certified to their respective Democratic and Republican party ballots.

Which ballot will I receive?

Colorado has not held a presidential primary election since the year 2000. In 2016, Proposition 107 recreated and reenacted state laws allowing for presidential primaries. As noted above, all active voters will receive a mail ballot for the Presidential Primary to be held on March 3. The ballot you receive is based upon your party affiliation. In brief:

- o If you are registered with a major party, you will get that party's ballot.
- o If you are unaffiliated and have elected to receive a specific party ballot, you will get that party's ballot. Visit www.govotecolorado.gov to declare a major party ballot preference.
- o If you are unaffiliated and have no preference, you will get both major party ballots. Please note: you may only return a ballot for one party. If two voted ballots are returned, neither will count.
- o There are no minor party candidates for the March 3 Presidential Primary. So, if you are unaffiliated and have indicated a preference of a minor party, you



will get both major party ballots. Please note: you may only return a ballot for one party. If two voted ballots are returned, neither will count.

o If you are affiliated with a minor party, you will not get a ballot.

To check your affiliation status, or to declare an affiliation or party preference, please visit www.govotecolorado.gov or visit a Voter Service and Polling Center.

I'm 17. Can I vote in the Presidential Primary?

The Colorado Votes Act (HB 19-1278), which took effect in August 2019, allows 17-year-olds to vote in state and presidential primary elections as long as they'll turn 18 by the general election, Nov. 3. Seventeen-year olds who turn 18 after Nov. 3 cannot vote in this year's primary elections.

How to vote

There are two ways you can vote:

- o Complete your mail ballot and return to a 24-hour drop box, Voter Service Polling Center or U.S. Postal Service. You can find available Voter Service Polling Center locations near you on our website. Ballots must be received no later than 7 p.m. on March 3, 2020.
- o You can vote in person at a Voter Service Polling Center. Be sure to check VSPC open hours before you go. VSPCs will be open on Tuesday, March 3, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

How to return your mail ballot

Once you've made your selections and sealed and signed your envelope, it's time to return your ballot to Arapahoe County Elections. You have three options:

- o You can return your sealed ballot to any of our drop-off locations by 7 p.m. on March 3. No postage is required to use a 24-hour ballot box. Ballot boxes are open Feb. 10–March 3, 2020 at 7 p.m. MST. You can return your sealed ballot to any of our Voter Service and Polling Centers by 7 p.m. on Tuesday, March 3.
- o Send your sealed ballot back by mail. You'll need to include postage, which should cost .55 cents.

Youth Awards Nominations Now Open

The Arapahoe County Mayors and Commissioners Youth Awards program (ACMCYA) has opened its 2020 contest to nominations. The group of local leaders works with the Arapahoe County Foundation and outside sponsors to award one-time scholarships to high school seniors who have "overcome personal adversity and have created positive changes in their lives." The students are free to use the scholarships at vocational, two-year or four-year colleges within the 2020-21 or 2021-22 academic years as long as they've enrolled before the end of 2020.

To be eligible, students must live and attend school in Arapahoe County, but their education can be in a non-traditional setting such as a group home or an alternative school. Qualified students must be nominated by teachers, counselors or other educators who are not related to the nominee. Relatives of County employees are not eligible to be nominated.

To have a student considered, nominating adults must complete the ACMCYA nomination form and submit it along with an essay, written by the nominee, that highlights, in no more than 400 words, what the student has overcome and learned to reach this point, and what they hope to accomplish in the future.

"It's difficult for many students to afford post-secondary education, yet without this level of schooling it's almost impossible to get a job that pays a living wage," said Arapahoe County Commissioner Nancy Jackson. "The Youth Awards recognize the hard work its takes to overcome all kinds of adversity, and these scholarships provide some help for bright, driven and resilient students toward achieving their long-term goals."

I have noticed a few residents of Walnut Hills having their sewer lines replaced. Read on and you may save some money if these people come knocking on your door and offering a "Free" sewer line inspection. They did one for me about two years ago and found that I needed to replace the line-\$12,000 to \$15,000 was their estimate. I did a little research and found two companies that work in tandem and DO NOT replace sewer lines. They will tell you if you have roots blocking your line. One of them will remove the roots for \$145.00 to \$190.00. If needed, the other will run a camera down the line and spray the roots to retard growth. That cost is \$200.00. I needed both, so for less than \$500.00 I was back in business. I liked that lot more than \$15,000. They do want to spray the roots every 15 months, but I found that to be very fair. They will tell you if you need a new line, but they do not do that replacement work.

So, when one of these salesman types coming knocking on your door and crying crocodile tears about the cost you are about to incur, call Hydro-Physics at 303-536-5956 and ask for Julie. If need be, they will do the camera work. Also, they will refer you to 24 Hour Drain and Sewer at 720-495-0354 (if you need it), and they will cut out the roots and spray them. Ask for Chris Haines. Good luck.

New Program Lets Arapahoe County Seniors Know Someone Cares

We may be living longer, but not necessarily better. According to studies, 29% of seniors in the United States live alone. Older adults who live alone are more likely to be poor, lonely and socially isolated. That's why the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office has started the Senior Check-In program. We want adults in Arapahoe County to know that someone cares. It also offers some peace of mind for family members living out of the area.

"This program creates connections and makes our world stronger. I have been calling my senior for three years now, and we have lunch on a regular basis! She is a great friend and confidant that I treasure. It is our hope that through this program more of these relationships with bloom and cultivate exactly what Arapahoe County strives for in 'an emphasis on community spirit," said Lea Harms, Communications Supervisor at the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office.


Seniors who join the check-in program will receive a weekly call by a volunteer. The volunteer will ask about their wellbeing and make sure they're doing OK. If there is no answer, the volunteer will call again until they make contact with the senior. If there is no response, the volunteer will contact the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office. We will call the senior's emergency contacts and will dispatch a deputy to conduct a wellness check.

To qualify to be in the program, the person must be 60 years or older, live alone (not in a nursing home or an assisted living facility,) and not have any relatives nearby. The senior must also live in the city of Centennial or in unincorporated Arapahoe County. We do not have agreements with other cities and towns to provide the service.

To join the program yourself or enter a senior in the program, apply here. We're also looking for volunteers to make weekly check-in calls. Apply to volunteer. Watch a video to see how it works.



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




Easter Egg Hunt

The generous support of Walnut Hills residents through the \$30 annual WHCA dues are what make Walnut Hills a great place to live! We look forward to seeing you at the hunt!



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

WHCA 2020 Dues To Increase To \$30 Annually

After some in depth discussion the WHCA Board has decided to increase the 2020 annual dues from \$25 to \$30. This increase came after looking closely at the cost of events and working to meet the desires of the neighborhood. 2019 was a very successful year of sponsorships with Walnut Hills PTCO, TING, Xfinity Comcast, Resolute Brewing, Parks Taekwondo, Metrum Credit Union and Little Anita's contributing funds and goods to our events. We are so appreciative! But with the addition of a few new events (Beer night, Halloween and Yoga) and increased costs, there is still an annual loss over the amount collected in dues. 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Three New Council Members, One Incumbent Sworn In


Three new City Council Members and one incumbent City Council Member were sworn in during a special meeting Jan. 6.


