Car Goes Through GID Fence Just North Of Briarwood Ave And Yosemite

On the morning of Friday, December 11th, icy roads led to a car losing control and crashing through the fence just north of Briarwood Ave. No one was hurt in the incident. Thanks to the notification of the neighbors, the GID was able to quickly get Blink's Fencing out to the scene and have the fence repaired. The GID handyman was then able to stain the fence. The accident was reported to the Arapahoe County Sheriff's office and the GID will pursue reimbursement from the at fault driver's insurance company.

GID Owns And Maintains The Perimeter Fencing Of Walnut Hills

Walnut Hills is a great place to live. We are fortunate to have funding to maintain, repair and replace our perimeter fencing as needed! This funding is gathered from a tax levy on the annual property taxes. If you know of any issues with the fence, please reach out and let us know! While the fence is checked regularly, there are issues that may go unnoticed. The GID asks that neighbors adjacent to the fence please help us keep our fence in good condition and remove branches and vegetation that is growing into the fence, and please do not hang, mount or attach any items to the fence (inside or out). Starting as soon as the weather allows, sections of the fence will receive new stain and we will continue to repair, replace and maintain the fence as needed.



Centennial Turns 20

I have the honor and privilege of representing you as a Council Member for the City of Centennial. I, along with Mike Sutherland are the representatives for District 3 – a district that stretches from Walnut Hills to a little east of Grandview High School

I want to give an update as to all things city council and where we might be heading in the near future. Of course, the focus of most of city council's actions has been centered on COVID-19. I have been "on the job" for just a little over a year. In that time, I joked that the city has gone from potholes and snowplows to pandemics, social unrest, economic collapse – and murder hornets. Probably like you, all business has been conducted via video conference. But, dare I say it – I have a feeling that we might just be turning the corner on this thing. (Of course, it might not be until summer or fall until sighs of relief may be heard; keep doing what you're doing to limit the spread.)

Unfortunately, the economic impacts will be around for some time to come. But, I am very proud that a lot of the City's energy has been devoted to the best way to help businesses stay open during these unprecedented times. Close to ten million dollars has been awarded as grants to small (less than 100 employees) businesses within the confines of Centennial. These grants covered lost business, as well as reimbursement for COVID-related expenses (PPEs and other supplies).

Currently, the small businesses that are getting hit harder than others are restaurants. The city enacted a temporary ordinance to cap fees charged to restaurants for third party food delivery companies. During the time when restaurants were forced to offer pickup and delivery options only (no indoor seating), restaurateurs reported that they were in financial straits because of this new, imposed "business model". Even as indoor seating is slowly opening up (as of this writing, 25% occupancy is allowed), many of these businesses are still "on the brink".

In more support for restaurants and small businesses, Centennial has been a leader in Colorado's "Five-Star" program. This is a program that allows restaurants (and other "large capacity" venues, such as gyms) to increase capacity as Colorado moves down "The Dial" (a system that places each county in a certain color, depending on the severity of the outbreak. Currently we are in "Orange" (although technically we're in "Red" – long story...) Working with Arapahoe County, we were one of the



first in the state to get this program up and running for businesses in Arapahoe County. It's not a panacea, but we are committed to getting these places up and running – quickly AND safely.

As far as tax dollars go, I believe that we're in pretty good shape given the circumstances. When the pandemic first hit, and were in complete shut-down mode; initial estimates with the little information provided showed the city taking about a 35 percent reduction in revenues. After more was known about the virus, and more information regarding revenues was available, best estimates had the City taking about a 15 percent hit. Now, even though final numbers are being tallied up for the year, the revised estimate should be less than 10 percent. That is a testament to not only the resilience of the economy so far, but also how the City is run. Projects are delayed, not cancelled. Budgets have been worked and re-worked to get the most value for what is being spent.

Speaking of projects, they are starting up again. The largest one close to you is expected to start soon. The Big Dry Creek Bridge, just east of University along Arapahoe, will see a replacement of a 74 year old bridge crosses Big Dry Creek at Arapahoe.

Also, you may have seen construction crews on southbound Quebec and County Line Road. They are creating a southbound right turn lane that should help turning onto County Line, as well as mitigate any confusion getting onto C-470. Project is scheduled to be complete by April 20.

Although not in Centennial, South Suburban will be completing their new ice facility in the coming months. When open, three "sheets of ice" (rinks) will be available for skating, hockey, pretty much anything that people want to do on a sheet of frozen water. Additionally, there will be a gymnasium that can be used for basketball, volleyball - even pickleball! Two indoor synthetic turf fields and a restaurant/bar overlooking the ice will round out what should be a very nice facility. It will be located on County Line Road, just a little bit east of Holly.

Another project that should start soon is the Centennial Link Trail. When complete, this will offer a continuous trail that links Centennial the hard way; 13 plus miles east to west. This project will utilize existing trails, as well as "rehab" some sections to make them safer for bikers, walkers, joggers, dog-walkers, etc. The project is expected to be complete in 2022.

Other items that come to mind...

If you have a little time and inclination, I invite you to be a part of the future of your city. Applications are being accepted to Centennial's eight citizen boards. These eight boards include: the Audit Committee, Budget Committee, Board of Review, Election Commission, Investment Commission, Open Space Advisory Board, Planning and Zoning Commission and Senior Commission. Since clicking on this newspaper won't do anything; go to centennialco.gov/boardsandcommissions on one of those fancy computers for more information. Deadline is February 28. It'll be worth your time.

This one might have flown under the radar. Centennial prides itself on being one of the safest cities in America. (The last mention was Centennial is the safest city in Colorado - #43 nationwide.) But last month, Centennial was recognized as the eighth best city in the country to work from home. So, even though a lot of us are getting a little stir-crazy with this Zoom meeting and that GoTo Meeting, at least we're doing it in style.;)

While the logistics of mass distribution of the COVID vaccine is still in the works, did you know that Centennial has been operating a mass *testing* site for a few months now? If you're not feeling 100 percent; or if you just want to be sure, the testing site is at Centennial Center Park (13050 E. Peakview Avenue (off Arapahoe Road near Potomac and Revere) It's open seven days a week, 8 am to 6 pm.

Wrapping up; Centennial is celebrating its twentieth year as a City. On February 7, 2001 itwas established. This was the culmination of over two years of effort by quite a few people to make Centennial a city. There may even be a few folks living in Walnut Hills that were personally involved (Hi, Andrea). In talking to some

of them, it is actually a fascinating history how this city came to be. If you get a chance to talk to one of these folks about it, it'll be worth your time. (If you search for "history" on the City's website, you'll also see a number of articles that tells the tale.)

Again, it is an honor to serve you. Definitely reach out if I can help with issues or questions you may have with this great city.




Kindergarten Roundup Class Of 2034 Register Remotely Beginning February 1, 2021!







37 percent of the final ballots were returned. NTMP policy requires a minimum 50 percent response rate.

As this application and plan have failed to meet the balloting requirement listed above, the City will not move forward with constructing the Costilla Blvd. traffic calming plan. The City is implementing a two-year moratorium and no applications will be accepted from residents along Costilla Blvd. for a period of two years from the date of the failed ballot.



Winter Weather and Sidewalks

There was a lively discussion on Next Door about people shoveling your sidewalks. The City of Centennial does not have an ordinance requiring homeowners to shovel their sidewalks and many people assumed there is.


What is the City of Centennial's policy on shoveling?

The City does not have an ordinance requiring snow to be removed from sidewalks. The City does not maintain public sidewalks due to the lack of resources available to perform this task. In the interest of public safety and the absence of a City ordinance, the City strongly encourages citizens to remove snow from the sidewalks adjoining their property within 24 hours after a snowstorm ends. Maintenance of sidewalks along state highways in Centennial, such as University Boulevard, Arapahoe Road from I-25 to Parker Road, and Parker Road is not the responsibility of the Colorado Department of Transportation according to state statute. Sidewalk snow removal along state highways is subject to the policies and ordinances of the jurisdiction where they reside; therefore, the sidewalks along state highways in Centennial are not plowed.'

Residents, businesses, homeowner associations or their snow plowing service are not allowed to plow or shovel snow from their private property, parking areas, driveways or sidewalks into the street.


Here's some food for thought for homeowners during winter shoveling to consider:

- Many homeowners with North Facing houses shovel for elderly neighbors as well, so please take that into consideration before complaining


