Walnut Hills Scholarship Winners Look to Bright Future

This year's high-school seniors will always remember the many ways COVID disrupted and distorted their senior year. But this year's Walnut Hills Scholarship winners remind us how hard our young people have worked to persist, adjust, and excel through it all. Want further inspiration? Two of this year's winners are poised to become leaders in the field of health care, tackling the medical challenges of the future. The third is on the front lines of the fine arts, finding ways to engage and entertain even in a year without in-person audiences.

To honor their accomplishments—and in excited anticipation of what they'll accomplish in the future—the Walnut Hills Scholarship Fund is delighted to present all three with \$2,500 college scholarships, funded by the generosity of Walnut Hills residents. And as we reestablish the rituals we missed in the past year, we look forward to presenting the scholarships publicly, at the Walnut Hills Civic Association's annual Fourth of July event in Walnut Hills Park.

The Scholarship Board is thrilled to announce this year's scholarship recipients, profiled here in alphabetical order:

PATRICK KRUSE, son of Walnut Hills residents Nancy and Bradford Kruse, and a graduating senior at Cherry Creek High School, describes himself rather modestly as one who has learned to not expect instant success, but instead to "pace out achievements." He is, as one teacher puts it, "driven and willing to put in the work necessary to pursue and achieve his goals." But what especially stands out is the clear direction those goals are taking him. Early in high school, well before the COVID pandemic, Patrick became fixed on a career in the health sciences. Under difficult circumstances—spending time at the Mayo Clinic with his grandmother—he was moved by the care the nurses gave her and determined to pursue nursing as a career. He got accepted into the Health and Wellness track at the new Cherry Creek Innovation Campus, where "his maturity," in the words of his counselor, "helped him thrive in the program and further his ambitions of working in the health field."

When he's not training as a pharmacy technician or certified nurse aide at CCIC, or pursuing his more traditional curriculum (especially heavy in science and math) at Creek, Patrick has found time for extracurricular pursuits. He has participated in Boy Scouts for twelve years, serving as patrol leader and receiving the Scouts' National Youth Leadership Training, developing skills to lead his home troop and to take on leadership roles in other fields. This spring he also achieved the highest rank of Eagle Scout. Another extracurricular highlight has been his three-year participation on Creek's climbing team. It was here, he writes, that he gained skills at goalsetting, competing with himself to gradually work his way toward higher and higher achievements. It paid off when he made varsity his junior year and competed at state, realizing another long-held ambition.

Patrick will take his next step toward his greater life goal when he enrolls at Creighton University in Omaha in the fall, pursuing his degree in nursing.

THEO LOEHR, son of Walnut Hill residents Jennifer and Michael Loehr, identified his passion for art and music at a young age. He began drum lessons at age eight and later learned guitar and piano through YouTube videos. Then, in middle school, he discovered a love of acting. He took this new passion into high school, majoring in Theatre at the Denver School of the Arts and participating in the school's Thespian troupe. At DSA he has acted in what his counselor calls "a number of challenging roles" and also worked as a production assistant and assistant director. He's also pursued a rigorous curriculum, including not just theatre but also six AP courses and many additional honors courses.

Outside of school, Theo remains highly active in music circles. He's drummer for a local indie rock band, Noble

5th and the Confidence, that has played at school functions and competed successfully at local music festivals, and he's worked as a session and live drummer for local recording artists. He also performs as singersongwriter for a second band. The COVID crisis has, of course, thrown the arts into turmoil, but as his theater teacher notes, Theo's "ability to pivot in remote has been wonderful," as he has explored the new medium of video and begun offering online guitar lessons to kids. "This year has highlighted that the future belongs to creative thinkers," he writes, "who can find new ways to make the arts accessible."

Theo will take his talents next to Elon University in North Carolina, where he's excited to major in Performing Arts Management, learning the business side of the arts while continuing to act and perform. He hopes to get involved, as well, in arts outreach for under-served and at-risk children. Whatever means or medium he can use to share the freedom and self-expression of the arts, he says, "I'll find it, just like art found me."

ANNA STRATING, daughter of Walnut Hills residents Tricia and Larry Strating, has a passion for helping others, but she has also found the confidence to face her fears—even when it means snorkeling with sharkel


Anna pursued what her counselor calls "a challenging college prep curriculum" at Cherry Creek High School, landing on the honor roll her first two years and the high honor roll these last two. She played on Creek's soccer team and climbed with the Creek Outdoor Leadership Training club. But she has focused above all on service, whether it's volunteering summers at Castlewood Library, helping to hook younger kids on reading, participating in Creek's Interact Club, which engages in community service work like Newborns in Need and Project C.U.R.E.; or helping freshmen find their way around Creek's sprawling campus as a member of the Link Crew. She is "always ready to help out the younger kids at school," writes a neighbor. Or as one teacher puts it, she simply has a "commitment to others."

But what Anna calls "the most meaningful experience I've ever had" is her participation in scouting. She started with Scouts BSA (formerly Boy Scouts of America) in 2019, when the organization first allowed girls to join. Elected Senior Patrol Leader of the girls' troop, Anna discovered a strength for leadership, planning, organizing, and directing troop activities. In 2020 she spent a week at Sea Base, the Scouts' high adventure camp in the Florida Keys, camping on an uninhabited island, deep-ocean swimming, and snorkeling the Florida Reef with its denizen sharks. Scouting, she writes, helped her overcome fears and made her "mentally prepared for whatever the future has in store."

This fall will find Anna at the University of Colorado, Colorado Springs, where she plans to major in nursing. It's a career path wholly in keeping with her service ethic—and, after a year like 2020, one that takes every bit as much courage and determination as swimming with sharks.

The Scholarship Board is honored to publicly recognize Anna, Theo, and Patrick — three graduating seniors who make Walnut Hills proud! And we congratulate the entire class of 2021, and all the students in our neighborhood, for sticking to their goals and inspiring us all with their energy through a most challenging year.

Finally, we'd like to thank the Walnut Hills Newsletter and the Civic Association for their friendship and help, and all our neighbors and anonymous donors whose generous contributions make the scholarship program possible—and have since 1972.
