Speed Humps

About 4-1/2 years ago Ramon Milian and Don Lammers complained at the annual meeting that traffic had gotten out of hand along E. Davies Ave. speeding and cut throughs. I took it on myself to specifing and cut unroughs. I took it on mysen to do a survey of the residents along E. Davies Ave. from Yosemite to Uinta. There are some 60 homes and I spoke with all but 8 over a two-week period in April 2014. I asked them if they noticed the problem and if so, would they be in favor of speed bumps, dips or something to slow traffic. 96 % answered yes to both curetime. The then councilman told me that both questions. The then councilman told me that the city would talk to some of these people-they

I forwarded this information to the city and a councilman at the time. For the next $4\frac{1}{2}$ years we have been lied to, ignored, put off by promises to call us back that never happened and told there are

no laws that will help us. The biggest thorn in our side is the public works director, a man name Travis Geiman. He once offered to put up no left turn signs from 7:00 AM to 9:00 AM along northbound Yosemite as it passes by Walnut Hills (much like the NO RIGHT turn signs on Quebec for north bound traffic as it passes the west side of Walnut Hills). He withdrew that offer before we could respond and now denies that he ever made it. One of his employees told us that the city has never used speed bumps and never will.

A year or so later that was disproved when we discovered new speed bumps on Eudora Street just south of King Soopers on Arapahoe. You can also find older ones on S Elizabeth St. south of Arapahoe Rd.

We were told to fill out a form NTFM and we would be put on a list for a planning meeting held each year in March. We did, and nothing ever happened. We've NEVER been put on the list and therefore NEVER been considered for ANY assistance to this continuing problem.

The one good thing was that new councilman Mike Sutherland held a meeting with Geiman, Milian, Lammers and I. The bad news is that it was the same old same old. Fill out the forms (we've done this before) and we will do a study (they've done one during construction on Little Dry Creek, so very few people were cutting through Walnut Hills) We were told that "If you qualify we will put you on the list for next March." (Where have we heard

In order to qualify the study must show that 500 vehicles drive down E. Davies each day, and the average speed must exceed 32 MPH; neither is going to happen. The majority of drivers in Walnut Hills obey the speed limit. All we're trying to do is compel the few that don't, to slow down before someone's child gets killed. Finally, I asked Mr. Geiman what COULD he do for us? His reply? Nothing. Fill out the forms, etc. I gave up. If you want to do something, write to the Mayor. It's our street and our town, not Mr. Geiman's.

Caution: Speeding Ahead

Do you stand out in your yard and watch the Indy 500 happen on the street in front of you? I do. And, in all honesty, there are days that I am also a participant. BUT, let's keep our neighborhood a safe place to walk, play, ride, bike and live. Obey posted speed limit signs and remember to stop at stop signs and look both ways for pedestrians. You can also call the Sheriffs Recorded Traffic Complaint Line - 720-874-3825. The WHCA has reached out to the City of Centennial Engineering Department to see what would be required to get an updated traffic study (the last one was completed in 2011 and is available on the WHCA's website at www.walnuthillscolorado.org) in hopes of finding an avenue to improve the safety of our streets. Additional information will be provided as it becomes available.

How to Get Speed Humps in Your Neighborhood

What You Should Know Before Starting

- Traffic calming matters are handled by local government. Some municipalities only require a signed petition. Others are more thorough. Check online for your city's application process.
- Policies also vary. Some cities pay for and install speed humps, some permit them but expect the neighborhood to pay, and others restrict traffic calming devices all together.
- When approaching city officials, be clear you represent a group of neighbors, not an individual. If the request comes through an existing organization (such as a neighborhood/ homeowner's association), officials are more likely to take it seriously.
- Maintain regular communication with your neighbors and your municipality.

 • Cities receive hundreds of requests every day so
- be persistent and remind your officials frequently

of the need for safety. Step #1: Talk to Your Neighbors

Find out if your neighbors recognize speeding as a problem. Do they have specific safety concerns? How do they want to handle these? Are they interested in traffic calming devices? Let them know there are ways to reduce speeding and you'd like to discuss these. Set up a meeting with concerned neighbors. If you can, organize this meeting through your block captain, neighborhoodgroup, or homeowner's association. You will have an easier time approaching local officials if you utilize existing leadership.

Step #2: Research Your City's Procedure Before the meeting, be clear on the local procedure for traffic calming. These specifics will help you determine your course of action. Cities often require a traffic or speeding study before authorizing traffic calming, so your goal might be to prompt this.

1. Identify appropriate department and contact person. The right department may be streets, public works, transportation or something else You may need to call your city to find out.

- Identify legal and preferred traffic calming methods for your municipality. Not every city
- permits speed humps.

 3. Identify the local process for obtaining a traffic

study. Check online.

4. Print related guides and applications from your local government's website.

Step #3: Hold A Meeting and Determine Plan of Action

By now, you understand what your municipality does or does not require. Come prepared to share this information with your neighbors. Have all necessary print outs on hand including a petition. Make sure neighbors sign the petition during the meeting. They should include their address so officials can see the number of households in favor of traffic calming.

1. Define the target segment (beginning and end location) in need of traffic calming. Remember, speeding may start before and extend beyond our block

Establish who will serve as the community liaison - the primary contact between the neighborhood and local officials. Decide how that person will keep everyone informed (group email, for example).

3. It's not usually required, but it can help to collect testimonials from neighbors about how speeding and reckless driving effects their or their family's safety and impacts quality of life.

4. Determine what data needs to be collected (refer to step #4) and who will be responsible for collecting it. Figure out a schedule for who collects what data when. Establish a shared document (such as a google spreadsheet) where you collect and share this data as a group. Remember, your neighborhood is collecting data for the purpose of presenting it to city officials, so make sure the format is easy to understand.

5. If neighbors are in favor of speed humps, ask if they willing to pay for them. A four-segment (78-inch) speed hump covers standard vehicle track width and costs around \$300.

6. Field questions and address any concerns neighbors have regarding speed humps and other forms of traffic calming.

Step #4: Contact Local Officials

The community liaison should contact the following community officials: council person, police precinct, and fire house. Additionally, he/ she should contact the appropriate city official (as determined in step #2)

Describe the speeding problem to each official:

1. Provide the name of the neighborhood

organization you are representing and give them the beginning and end location of the target

2. Tell them why you are concerned about speeding/reckless driving and site neighborhood testimonials/stories.

3. Explain that you've held a meeting and have a petition with a certain number of signatures from residents in the target area.

4. Explain the procedure you are following (If you have filled out and submitted the city's application form, sav so).

5. Be sure to ask the precinct and fire house if there are any concerns regarding emergency vehicle access. If so, ask if rerouting or other measures could help solve access issues.

Ask your officials if you are following procedure correctly. Do they have any suggestions? What additional instructions do they have? Are there resources they can provide? Ask the precinct if they are able to conduct a traffic study

Report these answers back to your community. Step #5: Define the Problem

If your city does not provide an application form, you'll want to create a detailed explanation of how speeding is a problem for your neighborhood. Use the initial meeting time, or a follow up meeting, to answer these questions and develop a plan for data collection (step #3, question #4).

 Identify target segment -- start and end location. . Explain how speeding effects the neighborhood here's where accidents testimonials are important

3. Data: Identify the number of pedestrians, generating facilities (such as schools, parks, restaurants, bars, transit stops, galleries, or any other place that encourages pedestrian activity)

and their proximity to the target area.

4. Data: Identify the number of pedestrians generating activities and the frequency of occurrence. Do neighbors usually hang out outside, food truck or ice cream truck, kids usually play outside

Data: Identify times of day when speeding

6. Data: Who is speeding? (hint: Is it the same cars

habitually speeding? If you can, demonstrate that a number of cars are speeding).

7. Data: Identify the number or percentage of pedestrians considered vulnerable population; this includes children under 12, seniors, cyclists,

Optional DIY speed study: If you're precinct won't conduct a traffic study, you can ask to borrow a speed gun and conduct your own. You can also purchase a speed gun for around \$80-\$100. Learn how to conduct a speed study. Step#6. Determine if a Speed Hump is the Right

Solution

Speed humps are inexpensive and incredibly effective, but they're not right for every road. A speed hump is an appropriate solution only if the target area meets the following requirements. The target segment must be

Classified as a local road

2. Not a primary emergency route/bus route/commercial truck route

Relatively flat (less than 8 percent incline)

4. Have a speed limit of 35mp or under

Step #7: Present Your Case

Gather the signed neighborhood petition along with official application or the documents created in steps 5. Include a short cover letter, along with your contact information, explaining the requested traffic calming solution and the reasons your community wants this. Indicate the starting and ending point of the target segment and the precise location you want speed humps installed (if applicable). Print (on official letterhead, if possible) and mail these to your city contact and local council person. You may also want to ask our council person to send a letter of support to

the city contact. Step#8: Follow Up

If you do not hear back from your city contact within two weeks, call and follow up. Ask when you can expect to receive and answer of the installation or on gaining appropriate permits. You may need to do this several times to get an answer. If necessary bring your formal complaint and other concerned neighbors - to council meetings or other relevant public meetings.

The teacher said, "Well, tell us what you have, and maybe we can help.



A Birdhouse Gourd

The summer heat has been wreaking havoc on the yard and I have pretty much stopped going outside. The thing is I didn't move to Colorado so that I could live in Arizona. You can say what you want about dry heat, but it is still too hot. I do see flocks of grackles gathering in the apple tree next door and the pumpkins I grew are almost all ripe now so I am hopeful winter isn't too far from here. People say it always snows on Halloween, so let's put them to the test.

Of the successful flowers in this weather, the top of the list has to be the helianthus. Mostly I grow sunflowers for the gold finches, but there is also helianthus maximilian. It is a western native plant and it takes the weather in stride, although it may stride too much. I have it growing together with some Campanula Glomerata, which is also a plant that likes to run. The bell flowers come in the early summer and by the time they are done, the Maximillian daisies have overgrown them and then the daisies flower in late summer. Succession planting at its best. My favorite part of this summer has been the birdhouse gourd. I grew it from the seeds I kept when cleaned out the last one. Most of the rest of the vegetable garden succumbed to my unwillingness to fight the heat. The zucchini turned all to quickly into giants. They were popular with the fish in the aquariums,





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
