Our last Dumpster Day of 2021 will be Saturday Oct 9th starting at 8am going to 1lam (or until the trash trucks are full)

If you are not a member, it is not to late! You can go online to Walnuthillscolorado.org and click on membership that takes you to PayPal to pay the \$30 dues (or bring a check/cash to event). Don't forget every extra load (or extra-long vehicle) is \$15 and will be paid at time of extra dump

Please remember we cannot take bricks, concrete, paint cans with paint in them (buy hardener at the local hardware store to dry the paint up), large pieces of wood (no railroad ties or tree trunks), no chemicals of any kind. But a BIG YES on your mattress, lawn furniture, and BBQs and stuff you have been waiting to dump all summer!

Also, this year we will have E-Waste recycle there too! Blue Star Recyclers will come again with their large truck. The cost of all and any e-waste is \$30 and will include what you can get in your car.

Walnut Hills Entrances Landscape Update

NAMES OF THE PARTY OF THE PARTY

The GID is working with Consolidated Divisions, Inc. (CDI) to develop a design for updated landscaping at the following entrances of Walnut Hills: Dry Creek/Quebec, Quebec/Costilla, Arapahoe/Uinta, and Yosemite/Davies. The landscape concept includes a dry riverbed, a variety of cobblestones (size and color), boulders and some native plant material. Additionally, boulders will be used to help support the slope of the landscape bed in several areas. A representative image of the design will be made available on the Walnut Hills Civic Association website when available - please check back in mid-October. We have had quite a bit of feedback that the entrances were looking dated, and we are excited to get these areas updated! Additionally, we are looking into the cost of having the perimeter fence painted. We do try to keep up with general maintenance, and some sections have been painted as a result of damage, but overall, the paint is getting worn out. We will update the neighborhood as information is gathered.

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
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Walnut Hills Welcome Letter

One of the functions of the Walnut Hills Civic Association is to mail a letter to each new resident welcoming them to the community. The names and addresses of new sales are provided by a board member who is a realtor. In the letter is a listing of the activities and events provided by the WHCA for all of the more than 1100 residents such as Dumpster Days each spring and fall, 4th of July parade and ice cream social, Easter Egg Hunt, Halloween party in the park, yoga in the park, National Night Out with free food and entertainment, Beer Night in the fall and Christmas lighting contest. Also in the letter is information on posing questions or concerns regarding the neighborhood by using the "contact us" page of the website or residents may contact their area representatives who can also be found on the website. whcaboard@whco.org Also on the website is information on upcoming events, how to pay the voluntary \$30 yearly dues and how to contribute to the scholarship fund that provides scholarships each spring to several graduating seniors to assist with further education. 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Short Term Rentals in Centennial

Centennial City Council, on 9/20, passed an ordinance on short term rentals (STR), read that as Airbnb, VRBO and many others.

Some of the stipulations on a STR owner. But, first, if you have a problem with a STR next door or in back of you, contact Ryan Thompson, rthompson@centennialco.gov. The law goes into effect 30 days after 9/20 but, it will take a while for the whole system to be put in place.

All STRs must be licensed. You'll be able to check up on their license at the City. 24/7, there will be reachable representative of the City to work on complaints. Operating standards will be drawn up before the program begins.

A Good Neighbor document will be written and must be posted near the main door of the STR to include:

The name, address, and telephone number of the reachable representative and information to inform renters that the city and neighbors have also been provided such information and that the reachable representative is legally obligated to respond to complaints regarding the short-term rental or renter conduct within two hours and to report certain complaints to the City.

- (2) The maximum number of persons allowed to occupy the short-term rental.
- (3) The prohibition on weddings, parties, or other large gatherings with attendees in number greater than 100% over the allowed maximum occupancy.
- (4) The allowable on-site improved surface parking locations and information to renters that (a) on-site parking on unimproved surfaces is not permissible and (b) on-site parking should be used before any street parking is used.
- (5) Information regarding location of clearly defined trash/garbage/recycling storage and removal, including the days and location of pick-up and informing renters that designated trash receptacles only may be used and that the property on which the licensed premises is situated must be kept clean and free from outdoor trash or storage.
- (6) Information that the licensed premises is located in a residential neighborhood and guests are required to be respectful of neighbors and adhere to all applicable laws, including without limitations laws governing noise and occupancy and gathering limits applicable to the licensed premises.
- (7) Notice that City noise regulations prohibit noise that disturbs, annoys, or endangers the peace of others and that renters may be cited for violations thereof.
- (8) Any restrictions on use of outdoor amenities to reduce noise complaints as determined by the licensee.
- (9) The licensed premises address, including house number, street name and city.
- (10)A list of non-emergency numbers, including the non-emergency number of the police department; and
- (11) The location of all fire extinguishers and exits, including egress windows.

Within 2 weeks of licensing, the Good Neighbor document must be delivered to each property owner or an adult resident of any property abutting or across the street of the STR.

If the STR advertises, s/he must list 2 persons per bedroom, number of bedrooms available, number of parking spaces off the street, no more than 8 people can rent the house and, if there is a party, no more than 16 can be in attendance. Renters must park off the street.

It's up to the neighbors of a STR, to make sure s/he keeps it legal. There's much more and if you'd like a copy of the whole law, just contact me at standy@ecentral.com; I'll send you a copy.

I hope that you and your family have enjoyed your summer! It has been a wonderful start to school here at Dry Creek Elementary. In mid-August, we welcomed back students to school who spent the last year in a variety of settings. Many students remained with us from in-person learning, while others are returning to in-person learning from online or homeschool settings. This year, we are serving over 300 students at Dry Creek. It has been wonderful to have the community back and engaged in-person with each other. On October 1st, our PTCO will host a Fun Run at Dry Creek's field. Families and community members are welcome to join by helping students obtain pledges, volunteer to help on the day of the event, or come watch the run! The Fun Run is a great event that raises money for the school while also promoting community and exercise.

In the coming months, there are a few important events that are important to know about at Dry Creek and across the school district. The first is the upcoming Board of Education elections on November 2, 2021. There are two Board seats up for election. 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Summer Has Departed And Fall Has Arrived

The heat has moderated, cooler evenings now prevail, and we can enjoy some time in the backyard or on the deck with some comfort. This is the time when we should also consider some things around the house that may need our attention.


Check the batteries in your smoke detector and perhaps consider running the vacuum hose and brush attachment over it as well. Dust can collect in your smoke detector and make it less effective. Also check the batteries in your flashlights, electronic thermostat, and maybe the backup battery in your alarm clock as heat can sap the energy from them. Finally, if you have a portable battery system for jump starting your vehicle now is a good time to check it and make sure it is charged before winter.

Your car might need some attention. Most people keep an emergency kit with simple first aid in their car. The adhesive on band-aids can degrade over a short period of time and should be replaced. Aspirin may be expired, and some alcohol prep pads may be dried out. Take a few minutes to review your first aid kit and see if anything needs replacement or updating. If you keep a small stash of emergency food and water, maybe that should be inspected too. Consider rotating your tires or replacing them before winter or before the first snow. A check on fluids wouldn't hurt and maybe checking your battery and consider replacement if it is more than four years old, especially if it is five years or older. And windshield washer fluid is inexpensive, so a gallon won't set you back.

If you have an indoor fireplace, check your fire extinguisher. Is it expired or discharged? Rotate it and turn in over a few times to ensure the contents have not settled or packed down. Maybe have your fireplace inspected and the chimney cleaned if you haven't had that done in a while. If you bring in firewood, check and make sure you're not bringing in any "guests" such as spiders or wood eating insects. Consider a couple of days of wood for emergencies if you have the room to stash it or just to make things a little nicer while the snow piles up.

Some small Styrofoam covers for the outdoor water spigots would be a good idea. These can help insulate the spigot and prevent freeze damage. Many people hire businesses to blow out their sprinkler systems, but end up with split irrigation systems because they did not insulate them or drain them completely. Also, check your snowblower now because repair shops get slammed after the first snow.

Finally, consider treating your trees to a bit of fertilizer and maybe pest treatment now and again in the spring. Many maple trees in the neighborhood show signs of chlorosis, too much chlorine in the water and a lack of iron. Also, many ash, locust, and maple trees in the area show signs of insect attack and should be treated to prevent further die back in the crown of the tree. A winter storm could easily bring down dead branches and bring expensive bills.



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Driving: Knowing When to Say When

For many Coloradans, driving is a sacred form of independence. Surrendering that privilege can feel sacrilegious, but there may come a time when choosing not to drive is the better choice.

Ideally, we will make such a decision ourselves, but it takes courage to acknowledge our limitations as we age. Solid self-management can maintain and improve our independence and trust while also reducing risks to ourselves and others.

Aging comes with expected changes to our health: reduced vision, reduced hearing, weakening joints and muscles, and slower reflexes, for example. Each of these changes impact our ability to drive safely.

It's essential that we recognize and act on signs that a loved one is no longer able to drive safely. It's also essential we consider whether these signs apply to us.

Approximately 90% of the critical information needed to drive safely relates to vision, according to Driver's Alert, the company that created the 1-800 number to report unsafe driving practices among companies with fleets of vehicles.

Cataracts, glaucoma, and other conditions reduce the efficiency of our sight as we age. Annual eye exams are a good way to monitor changes to vision.

Walk around your loved one's vehicle and look for scratches or dents that could indicate minor collisions with buildings, poles, and other vehicles. If such scratches or dents are present, respectfully inquire about them.

Watch for some of the following changes in driving behavior:

- Does the driver sit comfortably at the wheel or lean too far forward?
- Is she distracted easily?
 - Is he aware of road signs, pedestrians, and the actions of other motorists?
- Does she tailgate often?
- Does the vehicle drift into adjacent lanes?
- Does he wait too long to respond to traffic lights or other signals?

When it's time for this potentially awkward conversation, approach it with respect and curiosity. Ask the driver about her comfort level while driving or if he's noticed any changes to his or other's behavior. Discuss your observations but without being accusatory. Focus on future solutions rather than past problems.

One solution may be a driver safety class. The South Metro Safety Foundation offers several classes for drivers of all ages including Adult/Senior Driving Skills and an innovative Skid Car Class that utilizes a vehicle engineered to simulate winter driving conditions.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, at least 700 drivers aged 65 and older are injured and twenty are killed each day. Don't let yourself or your loved one become another tragic statistic.

When it's time to stop driving, make the courageous choice.



Jalapeno-Popper Dip

The best thing about football season may be the food. Here is a dip sure to please everyone on game day from Martha Stewart!

4 jalapenos (5 oz.)

8 oz. cream cheese, room temperature

1/2 cup sour cream

1 cup shredded mild cheddar (4 oz.)

1 jar (4 oz.) pimientos, drained

11/2 tsp salt

1/2 tsp garlic powder

1/2 cup panko breadcrumbs

1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley

1 T extra-virgin olive oil

Sweet-potato chips, carrots, celery sticks, blanched cauliflower, and cucumber slices

Preheat broiler with rack 6 inches from heating element. Place jalapenos on a rimmed baking sheet. Broil, flipping once, until charred all over, 6 to 8 minutes. Transfer to a bowl, cover and let stand 10 minutes. Remove and discard skins, stems, and seeds from chilis. Transfer to a food processor with cream cheese, sour cream, cheddar, pimientos, salt, and garlic powder. Puree until smooth. Pour into a 1-quart oven-safe baking dish.

Heat oven to 375 degrees. Combine panko, parsley, and oil. Sprinkle over dip. Bake until golden and warmed through, 15 - 20 minutes. Serve immediately with chips and veggies.



Walnut Hills GID Budget

The Walnut Hills GID budget for 2022 was prepared in late July. As you know, the GID (General Improvement District) is funded by a property tax levy on each home in Walnut Hills. This levy is approximately \$80 per year. The funds are used to maintain the fence and landscape at the perimeter. Each year, a preliminary budget is set by the GID Project Manager and the GID Representative and approved by the City of Centennial City Council. Below is the current fund information and 2022 budget categories:

2021 actual revenue (taxes, investment income) \$99,342.00

2022 Budget \$111,700

The budget includes items such as: GID Administration, GID Management, Grounds Services, Maintenance Contracts, Graffiti Removal, Shade Structure, Snow Removal, Irrigation, Fence Maintenance, Entry Monument Landscape and Storage Unit.

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
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
