Announcing the 2021 Walnut Hills Scholarship Competition With New Grant This Year for 2-Year College or Vocational School

For decades, Walnut Hills has supported its high school seniors by providing scholarships to outstanding seniors who are headed off to college or vocational school. We're honored to carry on the tradition in 2021 — but this time with a new twist.

As in recent years, the Walnut Hills Scholarship Fund will award up to three \$2,500 scholarships to outstanding seniors who plan to go on to college or vocational school next year. But new this year, we are thrilled to offer an additional \$1000 "Innovation Scholarship," specifically for a senior planning to attend either a two-year college or vocational school.

All scholarships are 100 percent funded by the generous donations of Walnut Hills residents. Now this additional one is made possible by the contribution of an anonymous, long-time resident of the neighborhood.

If you are a high school senior living in Walnut Hills, and you plan to begin your higher education in the 2021-22 academic year, you are eligible to apply. All scholarships are good at any accredited university, two- or four-year college, or vocational school in the United States.

Applications for the scholarships will be available beginning January 11, 2021. Application forms will also be available in the Post Grad Center at Cherry Creek High School (though you don't have to be a CCHS student to be eligible). The application requirements include a short essay and letters of recommendation.

The deadline for submitting your application will be Friday, March 5, 2021.

Neighborhood scholarship programs are extremely rare. But since its inception in 1972, the Walnut Hills Scholarship Fund has granted \$226,500 to 150 recipients, helping families with the ever-rising costs of higher education. Again, this is entirely thanks to the generosity of Walnut Hills neighbors. All of us on the scholarship board — Scott Bess, Peggy Castle, Laura Klee, Bill Philpott, and Janet Ragnow — thank you for enabling us to continue this tradition!

Notes from CenCON

Arapahoe Road Bridge Project

Construction will begin on the Arapahoe Road Bridge Project in the spring of April 2021. The project will replace and upgrade the bridge located on Arapahoe Road just east of University Blvd. near the entrance to the Cherry Knolls neighborhood on S. Elizabeth as it crosses Big Dry Creek. Built in 1945, the current bridge is 75 years old. Three lanes in each direction will be incorporated into the bridge with the road tapering to two lanes east of S. Elizabeth and will include safety measures for traffic and pedestrians.

To lessen the grade as it leads to University, the bridge will be raised four feet on one end and 5 feet on the opposite end. There will be lighting on each of the four corners of the bridge with a lamp style that is similar to those at Southglenn to provide a visual connection to the area. The existing raised median will be narrowed to allow earlier access to left turn, southbound traffic to lessen the backup in the westbound through lanes on Arapahoe Road.

The trail under the bridge will be improved and there will be access to the trail on both the north and south side of the bridge including ADA accessible ramps. The water channel under the bridge will be widened to meet requirements relating to a 100-year flood event. Every attempt will be made to minimize the impact on the trees and the landscape in the area.

While traffic will be affected, they plan to have two lanes open in each direction during construction. Advance warning signs will be placed throughout the area to give motorists ample warning of the construction.

As this is a multi-jurisdictional project, the entities involved in the project include the City of Centennial, SEMSWA (South East Metropolitan Storm Water Authority), South Suburban and Xcel Energy. The latter will handle the relocation of light poles and electric lines in the area. The \$6.4 million project will be shared by Centennial, SEMSWA and funds from Open Space dollars.

At present (November 2020), the bridge project is undergoing final design with construction to begin in April of 2021. Assuming that all goes as planned, construction will be completed by April 20222.

Food Trucks

For the past three months Walnut Hills experimented with Food Trucks near the Tennis courts. We had 3 different events and they were huge hits. Two were during the week and one was on a Sunday. We had been hearing from a lot people in the neighborhood that something different was needed, and with these COVID times it was a welcome distraction from cooking a few times.

All of the trucks we invited said very positive things about our neighborhood and said we were a "top" stop for them. In order for Food Trucks to be profitable they need to have at least 125 people to break even. All three of our events were way above that.

The Walnut Hills Civic Association Board is not a sponsor, but we are able to help advertise the event. One of the board members is setting them up on her own time.

For 2021 I have already geared us up for events twice a month and looking at Tuesday and Wednesday evenings starting in May 2021.







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


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
Walnut Hills Community,

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Macaroni Grill Site On Centennial Border To Be Redeveloped

Verdad, a national real estate development & construction company, has purchased the former Macaroni Grill restaurant property at 7979 Arapahoe Road, Greenwood Village, for \$3.2 million. The company plans redevelop the property, which consists of a 7,418-square-foot building situated on a 1.86 acre lot directly on Arapahoe Road.

Drew Isaac with Marcus & Millichap had the exclusive listing to market the property on behalf of the seller, a California based family trust, which acquired the property as a net leased investment in a transaction that Isaac also handled.

"We have plans to redevelop the property for a national client of ours and while we're too early in the process to disclose the actual user, I'm confident the area










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Dumpster Days
