Dear Walnut Hills Community,

Talking to families about raising children is a conversation I enter into on a daily basis. I listen to many parents describe the journey with their children to be the most rewarding experience as well as at times the most challenging experience of their lives. I believe being a parent is rewarding and challenging but it is also very complex. We desire for our children to make safe choices, treat others with kindness, love with open hearts, and be strong, contributing citizens. And at the same time we want them to be risk takers, travel abroad, stand up for themselves, and be courageous when faced with obstacles. As a we shape and mold our children, we have to be so careful in the way we teach them to view and experience the world.

Teaching children to have a GROWTH MINDSET rather than a FIXED MINDSET is one way I believe helps them to navigate any challenge that comes their way. Dr. Carol Dweck is a leading researcher in the field of motivation. Her research found that "students' mindsets—how they perceive their abilities—played a key role in their motivation and achievement." She teaches that a fixed mindset is the idea that intelligence is static and a growth mindset is the idea that intelligence can be developed. One critical component to remember regarding growth mindset with children is it helps them "thrive on challenges and setbacks on their way to learning." Dweck suggests we talk to our children about not getting things perfect right away but rather help them recognize they are growing step by step in their learning. When things are hard it means their brains are growing. Improving learning will come from teaching our children to continue to persevere even when things get hard.

Our goal at Walnut Hills Elementary is to foster a growth mindset. To do this we have to embrace, teach and practice a growth mindset at school as well as at home. Cultivating perseverance, resilience, and grit for our children will provide them the ability to reach their potential in school and in life. As we shift from having a fixed mindset to a growth mindset, we create a reality where anything is possible with hard work and the ability to walk through all obstacles that come our way. I am confident that together we can raise children that will change our world and future.

Our mindset truly is our reality!

I-25 Update

In the upcoming months the following activities will be happening during the I-25 Arapahoe Interchange Reconstruction project:
On I-25, crews will be finishing the third phase of the new I-25 bridge structure with final alignment on I-25 in place early-to mid-April.
Noise wall construction along Arapahoe Road and Yosemite Street adjacent to Walnut Hills as well as retaining wall work on the south side of Arapahoe Road continues. Construction of the new eastbound lanes of Arapahoe Road will also begin. Long-term full weekend closures begin in late March and continue through the end of May. These closures are required to shift eastbound Arapahoe Road traffic to the new alignment so

shift eastbound Arapahoe Road traffic to the new alignment so work can proceed in the middle of Arapahoe Road.

To maintain public safety while expediting the schedule, longterm Yosemite Street closures are currently slated to begin in early May to allow for construction activities on the east side of Yosemite Street. This work will be done in phases to minimize impacts to the traveling public – the first phase will be Yosemite Street south of Arapahoe Road and the second phase will be Yosemite Street north of Arapahoe Road. We encourage you to constantly check the project website and watch for weekly Traveler Alerts to help plan your route.







Fake Rain

Around 4 am I hear the distant calling of coyotes or maybe it is foxes I am never sure. I turned the pump on in the wine barrel on the patio only to have the water refreeze about a week later. I am sure the ground never froze this winter. None of the areas of the yard that usually remain frozen in March are frozen now. My wife insisted that she saw puddles yesterday and that was proof it must have rained but I have my doubts. Regardless the winter has been so dry that the whole landscape looks parched. Even the snow shovel seems to be feeling neglected.

Ever hopeful I have begun cleaning up the dried vestiges of the remaining perennials from last summer though I am concerned a bit that piling them in such a dry state might lead to problems. Not much progress is made in the compost piles when there is little moisture to keep the process moving one must be careful of fire. I have at least begun to find some early flowering snow drops and daffodils. All the alliums are

making a comeback now and the tulips are beginning to insist that I pull out some hoses and help them along.

I meant to move some of the iris last fall but I never did and moving them now will most likely prevent them from flowering this year. Seems I always plant things too close together in the first place but when there is so little I just can't stand to leave all that space. Annuals are of course what I am supposed to use to fill these voids. You'd think I would learn. Even so we will have enough iris to make some show.

Grasses are perhaps my most bothersome weed. Every spring I struggle to remove them from in-between the perennials. This year I think I will bite the bullet and dig up the whole mess and replant it. One grass though is my favorite, the blue oak grass, Helictotrichon sempervirans. The plan is to dig it up this spring and divide the clump into at least four sections and replant them. Deciding where to put them will I am sure be the hardest part and in time I know I will regret having put them where ever I decide and some part of that is why I garden in the first place. Just now I heard the pecking of a flicker on the chimney flue so I know it must be spring!



Spring Has Sprung!

The weather is beautiful and it looks as though it won't stop anytime soon, if at all! I know the temptation is to get out in the garden and to get going! Keep in mind, it is still early in the year, and typically our last frost lands somewhere around Mother's Day. Here are a few things that you can take care of now, and a few things that you should wait for.

Do it now:

 Finish any remaining fall clean up - this includes raking up and disposing of leaves, cutting back perennials and removing and broken or dead limbs on trees and shrubs.

• Remove any spent annuals and turn the soil - you can even incorporate some new soil into those pots or areas for annual planting.

Refresh mulch. Mulch should have a depth of 3"-4" and should not be placed right at the base of plants. Give those stalks and stems a little breathing room!
Winter water - keep on that winter watering schedule for trees

and shrubs. Increase frequency to 2 times per month, especially as the temperature approaches 80 degrees! While this may not seem like enough, the water encourages plants to grow, and bud, and bloom. Increasing the frequency will help them in the dry conditions without forcing them to get going too soon. If the weather continues on the same path, begin regular watering when you turn on your sprinklers.

Wait for it (Typically mid April or so):

• Turning on sprinkler systems - while the grass looks terrible, spot watering with the hose is sufficient at this point - grass



is amazingly hardy - as soon as regular watering is given, the grass will green up. Sprinklers are very susceptible to freezing - that can cause a great deal of damage and be expensive to repair.

• Leaving the hose attached to the faucet over night: Faucets, like sprinklers, can freeze. The hose traps the water that freezes and breaks either the pipe around the faucet or the valve inside.

Trimming shrubs for shape or size: for the most part, this can wait - trimming can
occur after shrubs have budded out. I like to wait a bit so that I know if there were
branches that didn't survive the winter are, then I can remove any newly discovered
dead wood and trim for shape and size. Roses can be cut back to approx. 6" above
ground. Be careful to trim early bloomers like lilacs, forsythia, flowering almonds, etc.
as they set buds immediately following blooming. If they are cut back or trimmed
now, you will lose the blooms for this year!

• Planting perennials - this is a risky move before Mother's Day - the soil temperature typically hasn't reached a warm enough temperature to allow the perennials to root.



Walnut Hills Disc Golf Tournament

The smiling kids and families playing disc golf in Walnut Hills Park have been a real joy to watch. The sport is leisurely enough that three generations can play at the same time yet challenging enough that you can play over and over again and never seem to get that elusive acc. Saturday, September 8th will be your opportunity to bring out the whole family to take on the 9-hole Walnut Hills Disc Golf Course for the chance to win some fabulous ribbons. There will be divisions for kids 10 and under, kids 11 to 18, and adults. As seen in the recently mailed membership forms, the registration will begin at 8:30 am with the tournament starting at 9am.

There are currently only 3 disc golf baskets surrounding Walnut Hills Park; however, your Walnut Hills Civic Association is in the process of securing funding and approvals to install 6 more baskets! This second phase of the project is estimated to cost around \$2,500 and will include six additional disc golf baskets, number plates for each basket so that you can plan the course in order, a disc golf rules sign, and a mulch ring around each basket. As with Phase 1 of the project, the new baskets will be installed completely with volunteer labor.

During the Walnut Hills Civic Association Annual Meeting on Thursday, March 9th, Metrum Credit Union graciously awarded the neighborhood up to \$500 in matching funds for the project. This is in addition to the \$300 that Metrum Credit Union provided for Phase 1 of the project. Our Civic Association is truly blessed to have Metrum Credit Union as a partner with their support of both Phase 1 and Phase 2 of the Walnut Hills Disc Golf Course, their involvement in our neighborhood activities, and allowing the Walnut Hills Civic Association to hold our monthly meetings in their building We have also sent in an application to the South Suburban Park and Recreation District Matching Gifts Program. The projects to be funded by this program are tentatively scheduled to be announced at the Board of Directors meeting on April 12, 2017. We worked closely with South Suburban on Phase 1 of the project and they also kindly awarded Walnut Hills \$780 in matching funds in 2015 to help fund Phase 1 of the project.

For those not familiar with disc golf, please read on for a brief introduction into the sport. The sport as we know it today was invented by Ed Headrick in 1974 with the first course constructed in Oak Grove Park in Los Angeles County, California. In 1976, the first disc golf targets were introduced with chains to stop a disc. Disc golf has become a very popular sport and is one of the fastest growing sports in the country, with over 4,000 registered courses with the Professional Disc Golf Association. As DiscGolf.com puts it, "Disc golf is one of the best lifetime fitness sports. It is easy to learn, a healthy activity and accessible to people of all ages and fitness levels. If you can throw a Frisbee® and you like to have fun, you can play disc golf." It is basically like regular golf, but instead of hitting a ball to a hole, players throw a Frisbee® or "disc" towards a basket hanging from a metal pole. The object of the game is to complete each hole in the fewest number of throws. The player with the lowest total cumulative score wins.

More information will be provided in a future newsletter article as we finish securing funding and go into construction this summer. If you are interested in helping to install the baskets, please email me at BrianBern@gmail.com.
