GID Update The Walnut Hills General Improvement District - Your Tax Dollars At Work

As you may know, the Walnut Hills neighborhood has a General Improvement District (GID) that was developed to assist the neighborhood in maintaining the perimeter of the neighborhood as well as contribute to the overall function and aesthetics of the neighborhood. This special district is funded by a small tax levy that is on all Walnut Hill property tax bills. The money is collected and held by the City of Centennial. This year, the GID has been working on several projects including:

- Repainting portions of the perimeter fence adjacent to Yosemite, between Davies and Briarwood
- Maintaining the landscape - This is done by an outside contractor on a weekly basis starting in April through the end of October
- The GID had two trees removed along Yosemite - one Pine tree (close to the Hunters Hill entrance at Easter Pl.) that was dead and a Russian Olive that had been cut back and was stubbornly regrowing (north of Briarwood)
- Fence maintenance including resetting and shoring of many fence posts along both Dry Creek and Quebec will be on-going for the next few months (as weather allows)
- Fence painting along the Dry Creek perimeter will be on-going for the next few months (as weather allows)
- Trash Removal - the perimeter of the neighborhood is walked and driven regularly to monitor and remove trash and debris. Please respect the GID areas between the street and the fence by NOT disposing of unwanted branches over the fences. Much of our perimeter is not accessible for parking purposes and so removing discarded branches requires dragging them to the nearest cross street for disposal. This can be a time consuming and labor intensive endeavor. If you have unwanted branches, please contact your trash company or consider utilizing the Dumpster Days sponsored by the WHCA in the spring and/or fall.
- Coordination with other agencies - For the last 18 months or so, the GID has been in coordination with the I-25 Arapahoe Improvement project on items such as landscape along Arapahoe Road. The GID has also been coordinating with South Suburban and the City of Centennial to have some concrete trail sections repaired and replaced.
- Repair of fence and sign (in progress) replacement on Quebec/Costilla

The GID was pleased to partner with the Walnut Hills Civic Association as well as South Suburban Parks and Rec and Metrum Credit Union to install several more disk golf baskets along the Dry Creek Trail in the open space this summer. With this addition, Walnut Hills now boasts a nine hole course.

Other projects that the GID has sponsored in the past several years include sidewalk widening along Uinta (2013), the addition of the sidewalk on Xanthia between Briarwood and Davies (2015) and the original 5 disk golf baskets in Walnut Hills Park (2016).

The Walnut Hills Scholarship Board is pleased to announce our annual college scholarship competition, benefiting Walnut Hills high school seniors who plan to attend college in the fall.

Four \$2,500 scholarships will be awarded this year. A fifth may also be awarded, if resident contributions to the scholarship fund allow for it. All high school seniors who live in the Walnut Hills neighborhood, and who will begin their higher education in the 2018-19 academic year, are eligible to apply. The scholarships are good at any accredited college, university, or vocational school in the United States.

Applications for the scholarships will be available beginning January 3, 2018. 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South Suburban Saves The Day

The damage to the turf at Walnut Hills Elementary and Walnut Hills Park occurred on the evening of the 4th of August. It was reported that only one car was involved. The damage depth ranged from 2-4 inches. The turf was repaired quickly by the parks division and it appears to be healing well. The turf should back to normal next year. It was noted that this type of damage occurs a couple of times a year at various parks across the area. No one has been charged with the vandalism.

(Response from South Suburban)

Here are some photos and what we did to "clean up" the vandalism:

-large vehicle created 2-4" ruts on two fields at elementary and the "big area" in the park. We used 10 yards of organic rich topsoil mixed with some turf seed (used our own soil/soil we made from composting).

-we usually spread it by hand (which would have taken 4 days), but came up with the idea to use our spreader, with the spinners removed, and have the soil fall directly onto the ruts (took us 1 day to do both sites!)-used a drag mat to spread and level the soil

Walnut Hills Sign Falls Victim to Car Accident

On October 18th at approximately 4:30 pm there was a car accident that destroyed the Walnut Hills entrance on the south east corner of Quebec and Costilla Ave. According to the police report, no one was injured. Two cars were involved, both traveling north bound when one of the drivers suffered from a medical condition, swerving onto the sidewalk and simultaneously side swiping the car in front of them and the sign. The damage to the sign was quite extensive. One stone pillar was completely destroyed, most of the lettering and part of the logo was torn from the sign face, and the second pillar had a chunk of stone and brick removed from the bottom 1/3. In addition to the sign damage, one section of the perimeter fencing was destroyed. The GID has been working with the sign company and our handy-man to get the repairs completed. The fence has been repaired and the debris removed. The sign will be replaced in the next few weeks.

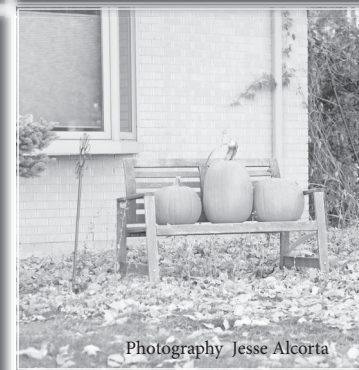

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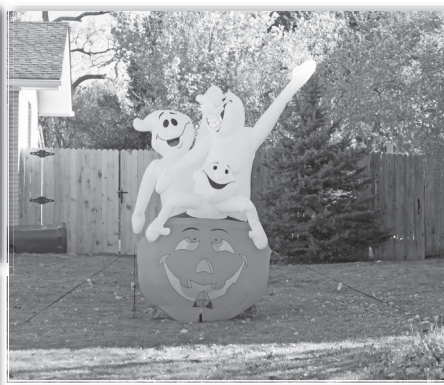
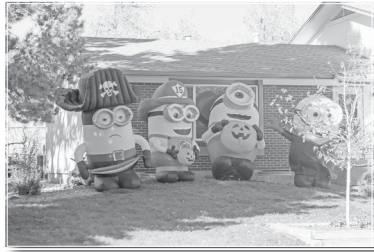
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What A Hoot!

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Project Update

The I-25 and Arapahoe Interchange Reconstruction project is expected to finish ahead-of-schedule. Remaining construction activities include: final signal and sign installation, median construction, striping, landscaping and additional punch list (final touch up) items. Intermittent lane restrictions will be required to complete remaining work.

Did you know? The length of all the median walls is about 900 feet. This is the length of about 2.5 football fields!

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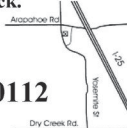
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The Garbage Man Guidelines

Pick Up Guidelines

Do's

For ordinary trash The Garbage Man asks that Clients Please:

Limit the weekly amount of garbage to either 2-96gal cans or 4-(50-75)gal cans,

Bag or bundle any/all yard waste and leave outside of cans,

4-5 bags of yard waste are allowed in addition to the regular cans

Make bundles 3-4.5 ft in length or manageable

Don'ts

The Garbage Man unfortunately cannot pick up the following items, because they are either prohibited by law or too heavy/unmanageable for our guys to pick up:

- Wet Paint/Batteries
- Cement/Dirt/Sod

- Concrete/Rubble
- Motor Oil/Any Oil
- Freon Fridges/Freezers
- Double-Boarded Pallets
- TV's/Computers
- Lawn Mowers
- Medical Waste
- Car Parts

For pickup of construction materials (wood, drywall, carpeting, etc) please call our office.

If in any given week for any reason the trash exceeds the above mentioned limit or if you are in need of a large item pick up, please call our office at least 24 hours prior to pickup.

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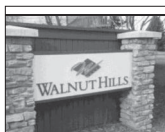
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
