# Walnut Hills Civic Association, Walnut Hills Scholarship Fund, And Walnut Hills Newsletter Are Joining Forces








# Walnut Hills National Night Out / Walnut Hills Block Party Was A Great Time



# Oh Rats!

I have always considered myself a "live and let live" kind of person. I put bugs outside, I don't kill spiders, and I think snakes are pretty, even when they get in the garage. Then there are rodents. That is a complicated relationship.

Last week, I was completely panicked when every warning light on the dash of my car was on and wouldn't go off, including the gas tank light, even though the tank was full. I carefully, drove to the mechanic, with someone following me just in case. Later that day, diagnosis, rodent damage. I'm pretty sure that was a squirrel. They like the salt taste in the wiring this time of year. I've had run ins with them before.

Then there are the mice that get into the house, for whatever reason. Chia power bars are apparently irresistible to field mice, but I can catch and kill them in old fashion snap traps. I also sometimes get a house mouse, which is way too little to get caught in snap traps; only the tip of their tail ever gets caught. I have live traps behind the refrigerator for them. Just a little black plastic rectangle with a door that closes when they walk inside it. Easy and simple. Catch and release. They always seem really relieved to be out of that trap when I take them outside.

Then there are the rats. These I have underestimated on more than one occasion. They walk around snap traps and glue traps, unimpressed. They are extremely intelligent and, in my experience, cannot be outsmarted. I used a live metal trap once and caught a baby rat in it. It screamed and cried so much, I just let it go. Baby rats are pretty cute. Most babies are.

That being said, babies grow up and there is an aggressive side to rats. They really love to kill baby birds in their nests. I don't know if it is for food or fun, but the nest I found was very much like a horror movie and I was finally compelled to try to get rid of the rats. First I tried the kind of rat poison that is just extra salty food. It's safe for the environment and it's just a "death by salt" plan. I bought four bags, not cheap stuff, and they just ate it up like dog food, not one rat harmed.

bags, not cheap stuff, and they just ate it up like dog food, not one rat harmed. Finally, I got bait stations with poison. They are plastic cases with the bait inside so other animals can't reach the bait. I bought three and set them around where the rats had been seen. This worked and soon the stench was quite apparent. I found a few bodies and used nitrile gloves and garbage bags to dispose of them in the trash.

There's no one answer to handling rodents. Live and let live is perfectly acceptable for the squirrel, I just park in the garage now. Live catch in the house where the other pets hang out works great. Snap traps in the garage and around the trash is easy for medium size mice. Rats are really smart though and reluctantly bait stations were necessary in my case.

All the recent construction on Arapahoe Road has rats relocating to Walnut Hills and it isn't a problem that will go away by itself. If there is any food at all, any warm place to hang out, they will multiple, naturally. One thing for sure, they won't be ignored, so pick a strategy. Good luck!

# Where There Is Smoke.....

After its brief sojourn in front of the sun, the full moon returned in early September red from the fires burning in the American West. The smoke was thick enough here so that on Labor Day we couldn't even see the foothills. It seems ironic that while Houston flooded, we baked in a late summer string of almost constant 90 degree weather. Usually this time of year, the grass revives from the summer swelter, but not this year. As usual, however, the crickets filled the nights with their pulsating rhythms and the sunflowers were filled with goldfinches harvesting seeds.

I have mixed feelings about Russian Sage. Tending to it causes my throat to close and makes breathing difficult. I did find that wearing a simple disposable dust respirator solved that problem, but still it is not something I like to do. In late summer however, the large blue flower spikes fill large areas when most everything else is failing. The plant needs very little

else is failing. The plant needs very little water and for that reason can flourish in places that the sprinklers don't quite reach. So I grow it in those spaces and avoid it for most of the year except in the spring when I cut the whole mess down to the ground and toss the branches into a large leaf and litter garbage bag. So called blue spirea (Caryopteris) has many of the same attributes, can be tended to in the same way though it doesn't grow as large.

Rudbeckia triloba is a tall, so called, brown eyed Susan with hundreds of smaller yellow flowers that bloom in the late summer and fall. Along with the Asters (Symphyotrichum, New England or, so called, Michaelmas Daisies) that flower at pretty much the same time and reach essentially the same height they make a fall display that rivals anything the spring can bring. Fall flowering bulbs are another possibility. I grow Colchicum which make a leafy mess in the spring, then die back and flower in the fall. Cyclamens are another possibility, though they are a bit difficult in this climate. Fall flowering crocus, of course, include the North African Crocus sativus from which the spice saffron is plucked.

# I-25 Update Project Update

The I-25 and Arapahoe Interchange Reconstruction project has progressed significantly since breaking ground in spring 2016. A few of the major accomplishments to date include: completing I-25 bridge work and I-25 paving, shifting Arapahoe Road and Yosemite Street into final alignment, building retaining walls on the south side of Arapahoe Road, relocating multiple utilities and improving business access in the northeast quadrant.

All major traffic impacts are expected to be complete by late fall 2017 and the project will likely finish ahead-of-schedule. Key project elements such as median work, final paving and final striping still remain and will require closures. In addition, intermittent lane restrictions will be needed for landscaping, irrigation and traffic signal and sign installations.




