Walnut Hills Scholarship Winners Excel in Scouting, Service, School, Sports

You don't have to be an Eagle Scout to win a Walnut Hills Scholarship, but this year three of the recipients are. You do have to combine qualities of high character, academic excellence, extracurricular achievement, and service to the greater good, and all four of this year's winners admirably live up to those ideals.

In its 45th year of honoring our neighborhood's outstanding high school seniors, the Walnut Hills Scholarship Fund will confer \$2,500 college scholarships on four new graduates of Cherry Creek High School. The four winners will be publicly honored at the Walnut Hills Civic Association's annual Ice Cream Social, in Walnut Hills Park on the 4th of July. All residents are encouraged to attend and celebrate our young neighbors' achievements!

Here are this year's Walnut Hills Scholarship recipients, profiled in alphabetical order:

KIRBY BERKE, son of Pamela and Andrew Berke, is a highly accomplished Boy Scout, participating in Walnut Hills Troop 257 for nine years, taking on several leadership roles, and achieving the rank of Eagle Scout in 2017. For Kirby, scouting has been a natural focus of activity, given his faith, his love of the outdoors, his strength for working with others, and his leadership skills. And the guiding, mentoring, and crisis management aspects of scouting have motivated him to become a "good Samaritan" to others, as his own role models have been to him. Kirby has also been heavily involved in outdoor activities at Cherry Creek High School, participating on the climbing team and in the COLT (Creek Outdoor Leadership Training) Club.

Kirby excels academically too. At Creek, he has achieved an impressive 4.488 GPA while navigating seventeen Honors and AP courses in a diverse range of subjects, from French to chemistry, economics to environmental science. He has also taken several business classes and participated in Creek's chapter of the Future Business Leaders of America. And for two summers, he combined his interests in business and the outdoors by working at a resort on Mackinac Island in Michigan, gaining experience in business and hospitality management.

Though he is known as a serious and high-achieving young man with a strong work ethic, the mentor figures in Kirby's life also point out that he is unfailingly humble and has a keen sense of humor. And they note his warm, outgoing nature and eagerness to interact with others. Kirby is next headed to the University of Denver, where he plans to study international business, sustainability, and Arabic. He's especially eager to study abroad and gain more experience collaborating with people from all cultures and walks of life.

TIMOTHY BOND, son of Tammi and Randy Bond, is "one of the good ones," according to his science teacher and advisor. He has pursued a demanding course load at Cherry Creek High School, completing ten AP and Honors courses, weighted toward his passions of science and math. He further pursues this interest as a member of Creek's Physics Club. He has also worked for the past three years as a program assistant in Willow Creek Elementary's Before and After School Program. According to the program director, "he is truly dedicated to his work" and "is easy to talk to, trust, and work with." He also "has a great gift for storytelling and abstract thinking which sets him apart from others." Outside of school settings, Tim's interests and activities are remarkably varied. A sampling: last year, he placed twelfth in the state bridge contest, while this year, he spent Memorial Day weekend at an Indian reservation in Washington, installing solar panels. But an area of particular interest for Tim has been the Boy Scouts. He has participated in Greenwood Village Troop 457 since 2011, achieving the highest rank of Eagle Scout in 2015. He has especially thrived during three summer outings at the renowned Philmont Scout Ranch in the

Sangre de Cristo Mountains of northern New Mexico. On wilderness treks of up to twelve days and eighty miles, he found joy in the climbs and spectacular views, and fulfillment in learning how to work with fellow Scouts as a group, "even when everyone is on the brink of fighting," overcoming obstacles and becoming a tight-knit team.


Tim plans to attend Colorado School of Mines in the fall, studying mechanical engineering, with the eventual goal of working in the field of renewable energy.


TORRE "TJ" BROWN is the son of two high school teachers, Rachel and Timothy Brown, which might help explain his propensity for academic success. At Cherry Creek High School, TJ has taken fourteen AP and Honors courses and compiled a 4.186 GPA. (He also racked up 99th-percentile scores on the SAT.) He takes a particular interest in math and the sciences.


Besides his rigorous course work, TJ engages in a broad range of extracurricular activities, including Boy Scouts (he has been with Walnut Hills Troop 257 since 2007 and achieved the rank of Eagle Scout), Creek's Physics Club, and the Creek baseball team (this year making varsity). But his greatest commitment is to church activities. He teaches Sunday school, leads a middle school youth group, and has traveled to the Navajo reservation in Arizona and to Juárez, Mexico, for mission work. This summer, he will take another mission trip, this time for a month in Ethiopia and Uganda.

Fall will find TJ attending the Colorado School of Mines, pursuing an engineering career. He chose Mines because it offers a partnership program with the organization Engineers Without Borders, which does environmental and humanitarian engineering for communities in need around the world. It was his missionary experience building homes in Mexico that inspired TJ to pursue this type of work. On that trip, he explains, he "found an avenue that allowed me to use my natural skill in math and science... to engineer and construct real change in people's lives." As his counselor puts it, TJ is "committed to the service of others." "What sets him apart from others," agrees his pastor, "is his genuine desire to love and care for others." No doubt TJ will have a significant positive impact in the world as he helps others literally build a better future.

MEGHAN GRAY-WHITE, daughter of Sarah Gray and the late Steve White, can certainly claim her share of academic accomplishments. At Cherry Creek High School, she has worked her way through a rigorous curriculum, packed with fifteen Honors and AP courses. She has a particular fascination for molecular biology and genetics. But in choosing her classes, she's made a point of "moving outside her comfort zone," notes one teacher, "and exploring new paths." She has also participated four years on Creek's speech and debate team, qualifying for state and serving as a captain this year. Her academic performance, plus a track record of citizenship, character, and service, earned her membership in the National Honor Society. But Meghan is one of those young people whose deepest attributes aren't reflected in statistics or lines on the resume. At an early age she has faced almost unimaginable family pain and tragedy; "intense adversity," as one mentor describes it. Yet she has proven "the poster child for perseverance," writes another. Besides keeping up her coursework and holding down a job, she has maintained a busy record of activities, competing for three years in cross-country and volleyball, serving as co-president of NHS, and working on a board that raises money for scholarships for kids to attend Camp Chief Ouray. As her counselor explains, Meghan received a scholarship to CCO, so she determined to pay the favor forward to the next round of kids who couldn't afford camp.

Maria has a love for language learning, and studied both Spanish and French throughout middle school and high school. She is now eager to learn Mandarin Chinese in Chengdu, China where she will spend her weekdays in a high school dormitory and her weekends and vacations with a host family. During this time, Maria will be learning how to speak, write, and read Chinese as she learns more about Chinese culture in the Sichuan province where pandas are most popularly protected and spicy food is a common characteristic of every dish.



Rose Marie (Kaizer) Olmsted, 87, of Centennial, Colorado, passed away peacefully while surrounded by her loved ones on one of her favorite days, Mother's Day, May 12, 2019.

Born September 1, 1931, to Joseph and Sophie (Wruble) Kaizer in Dubois, PA. Rose Marie grew up with two younger siblings, Deloris and Joseph. Rose Marie met and married her husband, David E. Olmsted while they were students at Penn State. David served in the Air Force ROTC which took them to a variety of locations. They eventually settled in Englewood, Colorado.

Rose and David started talking to Witkin Home Builders in 1961, as they were building their show homes at the Walnut Hills original entrance at Willow and Arapahoe Road. They had their home built on Briarwood Blvd in 1962 and they both lived in this home until their passing.

Rose Marie was one of the very first Walnut Hills Gals. She was among the first to welcome new neighbors with flowers and baked goods.

Rose and Dave raised their four children here and their house was always busy with their children's friends known as "the house to hang out at." She loved her children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren deeply.

As an outgoing community member, Rose Marie was a member of American Business Women's Association for many years. She spent 24 years working as a Vet Tech and Assistant at Peavy's Veterinary Hospital. Her children and grandchildren all keep her tradition alive in providing safe havens for pets as Rose Marie had an incredible love for animals. She was also passionate about children. After retiring from Peavy's she began a career as a Teachers Associate working with children at Cherry Creek schools in the special education department. She retired after 14 years.

Rose Marie and David had a great love of traveling, camping and fishing, which Rose continued on after his passing in 1989. She enjoyed retirement by planning casino trips with her friends, hosting and attending book clubs, card parties, and gardening. Rose Marie was also a Scout Leader, the head of many social organizations including book clubs, dinner clubs, and travel clubs. She helped as an election official with voter registration, and as a volunteer for her church.

Rose Marie stayed in the very home she and David built in 1962 until her final days. Her neighbors called her "Grandma Rose Marie" as she spent lots of time on the front porch enjoying her tea and greeting the children as they went by.



She was a great asset to this entire community for many years and will be missed and remembered.


Cremation has taken place, services and burial are pending and will take place at a later time to allow family members and friends traveling from a distance to take part in her celebration of life.

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

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
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Spring Dumpster Days Was A Huge Success!

I-70 Summer Road Improvements

With summer quickly approaching, construction activity will start to heat up along the I-70 mountain corridor between the Veteran's Memorial Tunnels in Idaho Springs and the Eisenhower-Johnson Memorial Tunnels at the Continental Divide. In fact, you might notice work starting this week on the Fall River Road Bridge that will connect Stanley Road to Fall River Road at Exit 238.

This is just one of several mountain corridor improvements, however, with the biggest undertaking – the Westbound Peak Period Shoulder Lane Project – slated to start construction in July. Here are some things you should know about this I-70 mountain corridor work:

• The Colorado Department of Transportation is working to coordinate program management and communication activities on several independent projects. This means you will have one website, one email address and one phone number to use in planning your travels. Watch your email in the coming weeks for details on these information resources.

• There won't be any work in the I-70 corridor for Fourth of July and Labor Day weekends.

• Most of the work to build the westbound I-70 Mountain Express Lane can be done while keeping two westbound lanes open to minimize the impact on traffic flow.

• Construction of the Fall River Road Bridge is slated for substantial completion this November, while the Westbound Peak Period Shoulder Lane Project is targeting a late 2020 completion with express lanes system testing following that.

• Other projects with shorter time frames include the construction of the Georgetown Gateway along Argentine Street, bike path construction near Georgetown, a mill and overlay project on Loveland Pass, chip seal repairs along State Highway 103 and ramp and wall construction at the Silver Plume exit. The goal of organizing information on all of these projects is to minimize public inconvenience and help people better plan their travels through the I-70 mountain corridor. We encourage you to share this information with your family, friends, and colleagues, and watch for more information in the coming days and weeks.

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E. Costilla Blvd Found To Be Eligible For The Neighborhood Traffic Management Program

Earlier this year, the WHCA requested an NTMP evaluation of Costilla Ave between Spruce and Uinta by Walnut Hills Elementary School. The City performed the traffic counts in late March with a total of 777 cars in a weekday 24-hour period with the 85th percentile going 30 mph in a 25-mph posted area. The street is also adjacent to a school. The NTMP application did meet the minimum threshold requirements and is now in the program. The next step for the application is that it will be evaluated against all other eligible NTMP applications and ranked utilizing Worksheet 2 in the NTMP Policy. The applications will be ranked after the September 30 deadline for 2020 NTMP applications. Please note, while the application did qualify for the program it does not guarantee that the project will be funded this year. The City receives many NTMP applications every year and it is possible that there are more applications that qualify for the program than there is available funding – this is where the rankings come in to play. Qualifying applications which do not receive funding will be carried over to following year and reranked. 
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
